

FAMILY LAW Seminar I-A

Pennsylvania Supreme Court Domestic Relations Procedural Rules Committee Update; and Child and Spousal Support Calculations and Modifications in a Tough Economy

The Pennsylvania Supreme Court Domestic Relations Procedural Rules Committee reviews legislation and monitors court decisions to ensure that the rules conform to developments in the law as well as to the realities of family law practice. In the first part of this session, Ms. Verber, an active member of this Committee, will discuss recent and proposed changes in the procedural rules related to family law matters and will provide updates, which may impact the rules going forward.

The second part of this session will be a discussion by Ms. Braun where she will cover and discuss how child and spousal support awards and obligations are calculated, and what factors affect the support calculation. Ms. Braun will also answer the question of what warrants a petition to modify support and will discuss how the courts are adjusting support awards and obligations due to today's difficult and tough economy.

Improving Legal Writing Skills for Job Retention & Promotion in Today's Economy

PRO BONO Seminar II-A

Mortgage Foreclosures

This session will describe in detail the Residential Mortgage Foreclosure Diversion Pilot Program, which was established by the Philadelphia Court of Common Pleas Joint General Court Regulation No. 2008-1 in April 2008, and will include how the Diversion Program has altered the usual foreclosure litigation process. This Program has offered hundreds of homeowners an opportunity to negotiate to save their homes from foreclosure. The roles of housing counselors, volunteer attorneys for homeowners, volunteer paralegals, lenders' attorneys, judges pro tem, and court staff will be explained, with particular emphasis on the support provided by volunteer paralegals who conduct client intake at court sessions. In addition, the session will also address conflict issues that affect volunteers from law firms, which represent banks and mortgage companies.

Time will be spent discussing mortgages in general, as well as options available to homeowners to continue paying their mortgages and thus avoid foreclosure. This session will touch upon the interplay between the Diversion Program and foreclosure defense litigation and explain what happens if the foreclosure proceeds to sheriff sale. Ms. Saah, one of our two esteemed speakers for this session, will explain how Philadelphia VIP, the City's premier pro bono referral agency, provides other volunteer referral services, i.e., estate administration, quiet title litigation, addressing property tax liens, and providing assistance in filing for divorce. Participants will also learn about both Pennsylvania and federal programs aimed at stemming the tide of foreclosures and the success of the diversion program in saving homes in Philadelphia.

The Benefit and Downside of Social Networking Sites

This session will consist of a panel discussion on social networking sites. The panel will provide a general background and overview of the various social networking sites such as MySpace, Facebook, LinkedIn and Twitter, and then the panel will proceed to go over the benefits and advantages of these sites for paralegals. The panel will review how information is categorized and sorted on each site. Also, the panel will discuss types of information that is contained in an individual's profile and will identify where certain information can be located or found. Each site sets forth its own company guidelines, and the panel will also review the types of activities and/or content, which is permitted or not permitted in its respective site as well as disclosing the requirements for release of information and records. The panel will assess, identify and discuss specific legal issues that may arise, which a search of a social networking site could uncover certain information to resolve the issue at hand. In addition, the panel will suggest various scenarios and situations, which a paralegal may encounter within their daily work that employing one of the sites may become beneficial to the case and/or research project.

The panel will also review and discuss the use of documents from social networking sites as well as the presentation of evidence at the time of mediation, arbitration or trial (i.e., what information is admissible). A review of recent federal and state cases involving use of documents from social networking sites will be addressed as well as the ethical issues concerning the use of such documents.

ETHICS – ELDER ABUSE I

Seminar III-C

Every year, tens of thousands of elderly Americans are abused in their own homes, in relatives' homes, and even in facilities responsible for their care. Today, elder abuse reporting laws exist in every state to protect elderly people being abused physically or emotionally and/or suffering from neglect. Ms. Mathes will discuss Pennsylvania laws pertaining to the reporting of elder abuse and neglect, and will specify who are considered mandated reporters of elder abuse under Pennsylvania law. In addition, she will discuss the obligations of mandated reporters, and the options for those who are not considered mandated reporters. This presentation will increase paralegals' ability to become aware and recognize elder abuse and neglect. Also, Ms. Mathes will point out how one can readily identify the factors that may result in elder abuse and neglect, and then later will discuss one's obligations for reporting suspected abuse. Additionally, this session will provide information regarding services available for investigating and responding to cases of abuse and neglect. Community responses to elder abuse will be discussed as well.
